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## FUTURE TALENTS CUP®

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### 1. Foreword

The mission of the FUTURE TALENTS CUP (FTCup) is to help junior athletes acquire international experience, particularly in ball games.

The organisers have set themselves the task of organising annual friendly international games and sports events in various sports for interested sports clubs, that is, primarily for children participating in sports activities there. The aim is to provide young athletes with opportunities to get better prepared for future challenges in both sports and in life in general, through acquiring new, hitherto unknown experiences.

Direct international experience has come to be indispensable for a successful career in any sports today and it may improve one's life and make one more successful in adulthood in all walks of life. Participation in international games also facilitates the professional activities and development of sports clubs and associations.

Owing to differences between stages of development reached by children of the same ages and to other well-known reasons not everybody has opportunities to participate in international events or even to travel abroad. Of course not everyone can be on the junior national squad and not everyone is born in favourable places and/or circumstances for a career in sports. Making progress and developing is more difficult for those living in less favourable conditions. Such challenges are also faced by sports associations.

All athletes, coaches and sports managers dream of stepping on the pitch or in the arena in iconic sports facilities or stadiums they are only familiar with through the media, or of playing against international adversaries. And when such dreams come true, the experience and the memories can never be forgotten, they linger on throughout one's life. The FTCup may provide the one of the best episodes of the sports carriers of many, something they will always remember.

The organiser of the FTCup initiative is a non-profit organisation, aiming to help making the above dreams and goals turn into reality with the help of sponsors, donors and volunteers. FTCup aims at making it possible for athletes and sports clubs to participate in the sports events it organises, partly or fully free of charge (including the costs of travelling, accommodation, meals and other auxiliary expenditures).

FTCup wishes not to provide prizes for competition and results but to contribute to participation in the spirit of FAIR PLAY (in a moral as well as financial aspect), in line with the 'one for all' motto.

FTCup opens up opportunities for junior athletes and their clubs and associations, including those who have never had a chance to participate in an international event. Indeed, it publishes data, photos and videos of the participants on its website to help them become better known on an international level.

FTCup declares its intent not to compete with any national, continental or global sports organisation, to the contrary, it wishes to cooperate with such organisations and with anyone pursuing similar goals, in order to make international participation in sports for as many children and clubs as possible.

FTCup, intends to organise and support sports events in regular field football, futsal, handball, basketball, water polo and ice hockey (the list may be extended). These may be implemented gradually to ensure events repeated year after year, to provide for long term sustainability).

The expected participants of the FTCup include talented young athletes whose strong willpower, toughness and resilience may serve as a good example for younger generations and for all in general. The organisers of FTCup also wish to help young people in less fortunate circumstances, therefore they donate 10% of their annual revenues from sponsorship, to child protecting organisations.



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In the spirit of the above and based on the considerations laid out below, the organisers of FTCup wish to help all, as enabled by the available financial and other resources and they kindly request contributions from generous sponsors, donors, volunteers and sports federations to help young athletes, sports clubs, child protecting and other charity organisations.

In line with the initiative's basic concept and subject to the availability of resources, the peak of the annual sports events will be a special event over of days, taking place simultaneously with the finals of the tournaments, at venues (stadiums, sports centres) made available by the participating clubs in each of the different sports, to which all of the athletes, sports managers and clubs participating in the events of the given sport during the year, will be invited. FTCup wishes to cover the costs of the participating invitees with the help of its sponsors to enable all children and sports managers to be present and celebrate their performance of over the year together.

In addition to colourful programmes and sightseeing in the host city these events are also planned to include the finals and semi-finals of the tournaments of the various age categories, along with, as far as possible, a 'show match' with participation of adult international top athletes. These events would include the awards ceremonies with the involvement of sponsors and donors, charity organisations and other partners.

## 2. General Provisions

The purpose of this code is to set out the rights, obligations and responsibilities of the parties participating in preparations for and in the organisation and implementation of regular field football tournaments and associated events along with those of the participants. The organiser shall have the power to make decisions concerning any matter relating to this code and FTCup. (Other sports are governed by similar sport-specific codes.)

## 3. The Organiser

The professional sport organiser of the FTCup series is Ferencvárosi Torna Club (e.g., obtains UEFA authorisations) other tasks will be carried out by Future Talents Cup nonprofit Kft. The official website of the initiative: [www.ftcup.eu](http://www.ftcup.eu)

## 4. The Sports Arbitration Board (SAB)

The SAB adopts decisions concerning any dispute stemming from or in relation to FTCup football matches and any unpredictable issue or issues not regulated, along with any sanctions. The Board shall be comprised of the following members:

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### **5. Participants, Age Groups, Rules of Participation, Responsibilities, Liability**

The FTCup series will be organised each year for invited football clubs that can enter their junior men's teams, from as many countries as possible.

The organiser shall make its decisions on the number of teams and age categories to be invited, in view of its financial resources. The final list of participants and the groups to which they are assigned will be published each year at [www.ftcup.eu](http://www.ftcup.eu), at least 8 weeks before the kick-off of the events of the FTCup series.

The invited clubs may participate in the matches of the tournaments with their registered players nominated for the tournament according to Annex 1.

A player may only represent one club on the Autumn - Spring match days of a given tournament.

The participating clubs sign a written contract with the organiser in advance, in which they undertake to ensure that they, their representatives and players accept the provisions laid out in this code as binding on them. Moreover, they shall accept decisions adopted by the organiser and the SAB concerning the FTCup matches as binding on themselves, without disputing such decisions.

#### **The participating clubs undertake to:**

- comply with the rules of the international, continental and their domestic federations (rules on doping, fair play etc.).
- participate in the FTCup matches with their strongest possible teams in each age category.
- upload the data of their players entered for the tournament to FTCup's website (e.g. photo, name, date of birth, body weight, height etc.).
- produce HD video footage suitable for television broadcasting, along with sports photos of the matches, for the organiser.
- respect FTCup and to refrain from acting in the name or on behalf of FTCup without the organisers' prior written permit.

#### **The clubs shall be responsible for:**

- obtaining visas as necessary. In such cases the visiting clubs may request assistance from the host team.
- the behaviour of their players, representatives, members, officers and supporters attending matches.
- raising and making available the resources required for the organisation and holding of matches (each within its scope of control and interests).
- maintaining the necessary order, safety insurance before, during and after the matches.
- obtaining the necessary authorisations and permits/licences from the federations etc. as necessary, for the organisation of and participating in international matches. (They shall conclude any required contracts and agreements in their own names, under their own responsibility and at their own expense.)



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### 6. Implementation, Rules of the Game, Scoring, Substitutions

The matches shall be organised in accordance with the 'Laws of the Game' laid down by the International Football Association Board (IFAB), in view of any different rule as may be set out in this code.

Groups shall be formed in line with the number of the participating clubs and their junior teams (Annex 1). **The different age groups of the clubs shall participate in the same initial groups and in accordance with the drawing of teams and efforts should be made to ensure that this scheme is maintained when the same clubs' different age teams progress to the next round** (for cost effectiveness considerations).

Another requirement to be met as far as possible in the group rounds is that **teams of the same country should not play against each other** because that would not yield new experience.

The goal of the tournament is for the players to acquire as much international experience as possible, therefore the group rounds will take place in a **single leg system (without return matches)**. Every team will play every other one in its own group (without second leg matches).

The positions shall be determined according to Annex 1. If a **game fails to take place** owing to a force majeure event, or for any other reason outside the control or interests of the parties (e.g. weather conditions), **the official result shall be a draw, with an end result of 0:0**. If a team declines to play a game, its previous results shall be cancelled.

### 7. Venues and Dates

As a consequence of the climate conditions stemming at the geographical location of the participating clubs the group matches shall take place preferably between August and June to minimise any conflict with examinations the participating children may have to take at the end of their school years.

The venues for the group matches shall be made available by the organiser. The exact match dates and times and locations shall be determined and disclosed by the participating parties at least 4 weeks before the match days, in accordance with the preliminary schedule adopted by FTCup (this has been established in view of the programmes of the clubs, the national junior select teams and other relevant international commitments).

The organiser shall announce the venues and the dates/times of the closing ceremony and the final matches at least 4 months in advance.

The starting times of the matches must be set in view of the requirements of a live television broadcasting.

### 8. Stadium and Pitch requirements

The venues of the games, the layout, design and equipment of the fields (training fields) must be up to the standards prescribed by the continental and national sports federations and they must be suitable for the production of HD recording for television broadcasting. The home teams must inform the visiting teams in good time in advance concerning the coverage of the field (grass, artificial surface) and other relevant circumstances (lighting etc.).



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### **9. Sports uniforms**

The teams shall play the matches wearing pre-agreed uniforms of different colour combinations. In case the referee finds that the teams have not chosen colours that can be sufficiently easily distinguished from one another, the home team shall change their uniforms.

### **10. Referees**

It is the home team's obligation to engage, at its own expense, an official referee, a sufficient number of assistant referees and the necessary reserves, who are capable of presiding over the game, with adequate training, holding referee licences in accordance with the requirements prescribed by FIFA (e.g. with the approval of their domestic federation or by delegating referees).

The home club must inform the referees about any rule set out in this code that are different from the general rules adopted by IFAB (e.g. about the friendly nature of the game, its purpose, the age limits, the numbers of substitutions and breaks, the 0:0 rule in case of force majeure, the electronic record (data upload) etc.).

In the spirit of fair play in the case of any circumstance observed by the referee or either of the parties, hindering the implementation of the programme, the referee and the representatives of the home and visiting teams agree on a preliminary basis, on conditions deviating from the rules that have been laid down (making sure however, that such conditions cannot jeopardise anybody's bodily integrity, safety or welfare), to enable the children to play the match.

This must be recorded and from that point on the outcome of the game cannot be disputed with reference to such circumstances (e.g. if either team can only play with one or more over-age children in the team owing to illness – in such cases the parties may even agree on a handicap in terms of goals or they may agree on a fixed result at the end of the game which may be disadvantageous for the team not complying with the rules and may assist the other team). If such an agreement results in an unreasonable, extreme number of goals or an extraordinary goal difference the SAB shall be entitled to alter the result entered in the match log in view of the circumstances, in the interest of the team that complied with all of the rules or of indirectly affected participating teams (fair play).

### **11. Pre-game tasks**

The referees shall arrive at the given location at least 90 minutes before the kick-off of the game. They must carry out the checks prescribed by the applicable international rules (soil, grass, artificial surface, pitch accessories, balls, colour combinations of the teams, substitutes, ball-kids, availability of substitution cards etc.).

The match log – with the required data of the playing teams entered – and the competition permits, personal identity cards or passports supporting the data must be made available for the referees at least 60 minutes before kick-off time (the teams shall allow each other and the referee shall allow the teams to change data in the log, of the players entered for the game, up to the commencement of the match, in case of any injury suffered during warm-up or in case this is necessitated by any other relevant circumstance).

Qualified medical personnel as prescribed by the international and national federations and the relevant statutory regulations shall be present in accordance with the prescribed conditions and for the prescribed length of time, and they shall intervene as necessary.

Digital team photos, reflecting a good atmosphere, shall be taken before the kick-off of the match, of the 11 starting players of the teams separately and of the 22 starting players of the two teams



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together, preferably by a photographer, in a high quality and with contents that are not offensive for anyone (in accordance with FTCup's charity partners, sponsors and/or donors).

Thereafter – following handshakes between players and between players and referees and saluting the audience – the match is kicked off.

It is kindly requested by the organisers that the above data, photos, videos and interesting details concerning the match as it progresses be continuously uploaded by the teams' authorised and empowered representatives, to the electronic record and news stream on the organiser's website to make them immediately available in various electronic media for those interested.

### 12. Post-game tasks

After the end of the game the match log shall be closed in accordance with the generally applying rules, after recording the necessary data and notes (goals, scorers, recipients of the yellow or the red card etc.) and shall be handed over to the participating parties.

The log data shall be uploaded by the home team within 24 hours to the organiser's website and the photos taken and the videos recorded shall be also transmitted electronically, within 24 hours, to the organiser or its agent.

Any comment or disputed issue relating to the match must be recorded in the log. If this is not possible, the comments on the match shall be filed with the SAB with a 3-working day forfeit period.

### 13. Refusal to play, Cancellation of a Match, Match Abandoned, Continued, etc.

Decisions in the above cases shall be taken by the SAB on the basis of the available information. The SAB shall determine the end result of the game to be recorded (see also: Section 10) and the sanctions to be applied to the party that broke the rules (e.g. refunding of the cost reimbursement provided by the organiser, etc.). The parties shall cooperate in the spirit of fair play and shall avert any circumstance that may impede or prevent the match from being played, and they shall use their best efforts to ensure that the children can play the match in a good atmosphere, without any interference.

### 14. Disciplinary Cases, Objections, Complaints

**Red card:** – If an immediate red card is shown, the player concerned shall be banned from the next 2 matches of the tournament. The red card following the second yellow card in the game shall result in the banning of the player for 1 match.

**Yellow card:** – 3 yellow cards in different matches of the tournament shall entail the player's banning for 1 match.

At the end of each phase of the event (group matches, finishing of the tournament), the above sanctions shall lapse and the players shall enter the next round or the next year's tournament with a clean slate. Exceptions to this shall include sanctions for the following examples seriously unfair conduct.

In the case of a seriously unfair act or a major incident occurring in any phase or any match of the tournament the referee shall also notify this to the national federation of to which the party at fault (player, coach, club employee) belongs. Decision on the consequences of such a case shall be made by both the given national federation and SAB. Though the organiser is determined to facilitate young players' learning and acquiring experience and it does not wish to ban players from participating in the matches without good reason, the organiser considers it crucial that such learning process



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should also involve players' understanding that compliance with the rules and regulations as well as paying respect to adversaries, referees and supporters, are equally indispensable requirements. Binding and unappealable decisions concerning any objection or protest shall be made SAB. The SAB shall make no decisions concerning the activities of the referee, thus such petitions shall be automatically turned down.

### **15. Medals, Prizes**

The winner of the tournament, the second and the third team shall receive 30 medals per age group. The winner in each age group will receive a cup. Players of outstanding performance, the best clubs and teams in terms of fair play shall also be rewarded.

The organisers do not intend to provide cash or other pecuniary reward or bonus for the best results (but no such offerings by sponsors shall be ruled out), instead, they will use their funds to cover the costs of participation, for organisation, for sponsorships, documentation and for the promotion of the event as well as for increasing the number of participants and the list of sports to be sponsored.

### **16. Insurance**

Every participant of each FTCup event shall be responsible for his or her own insurance, or insurance coverage may be arranged by the participating clubs for their players and other representatives. It is the responsibility and obligation of the participating clubs to take out necessary and adequate insurance in advance, at their own expense, with reliable insurance companies, for all of their representatives (including players, official representatives etc.) for the duration of and including the FTCup events.

It is the responsibility and obligation of the host clubs to have adequate insurance for the matches and events they will organise, covering all participating individuals, objects, property, economic damage, force majeure events etc. Such insurance contracts shall cover all risks relating to the events, including third party risks and they shall provide adequate guarantee and coverage for any accident, damage and/or any other presently unforeseen events. Only those clubs, players, representatives, participating parties and other persons may participate in the events who accept that the FTCup and its organiser shall not be liable for any damage, accident or claim occurrence etc. occurring in relation to events or matches organised by the participating clubs, other participating parties or third parties.

### **17. Costs**

It is envisaged by the organisers that the participating teams shall stage their matches drawn to be their home games using their own infrastructure, at their own expense, in accordance with the junior rules applying to the IFAB and UEFA rules on international friendly games, with emphasis on FAIR PLAY (as the organisers hold that participation is truly more important than winning).

The organisers try to provide full or partial cost reimbursement for the participating clubs for their away games depending on the number of participants, the distance, the required accommodation and the mode of transport. It is the organisers' aim to make sure that participation does not entail a financial burden for the clubs and that the cost reimbursement provided for away games covers the costs – in part or in full – of the home games and other costs relating to participation (e.g. referee, video footage, photographer etc.). The extent to which this may be accomplished will evidently depend on the contributions offered by partners, donors and sponsors, which will have a profound bearing on the number of teams to be invited.



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Organisation and the widest possible participation, and implementation (e.g. more teams, more age groups, more sports, increased charity budget etc.) will be greatly facilitated if the clubs themselves are also willing to devote resources to participation in the tournament, thereby making it easier for the organisers to do their tasks. Such undertakings and offerings will enable the organiser to provide increased support for those in need, for the less fortunate and for those facing difficulties (the organiser is a non-profit organisation).

If the visiting team travels by air the home team must provide bus transit between airport, the visiting team's accommodation and the venue of the match and the training ground, if any.

It is the organisers' goal to make sure that the matches attract the interest of the public both at the venues and in the media, therefore matches or highlights of the matches may be broadcast by television or on-line, therefore they encourage the participants to advertise the matches themselves too, and to stage them before the largest possible audience.

### **18. Revenues**

The organiser shall determine the utilisation of the funds, donations, technical and other equipment and instruments, donations etc. received from sponsors, donors and partners (the participating clubs themselves, along with their owners and sponsors may also sponsor FTCup).

The home teams shall dispose over the revenues received directly from or in relation to the event/match (ticket revenues, sales of refreshments, concession and advertisement revenues etc.) which they may use for covering their costs (rental, lighting, insurance, security, organisation, referees etc.).

### **19. Media, Marketing, Commercial rights**

Of their home games the participating clubs shall produce HD quality video recordings and digital photos, suitable for television and on-line broadcasting. The advertisements of the organiser's charity partners, sponsors and donors shall be displayed at the matches in the sizes and at the places required the partners, sponsors and donors, and they shall, to the extent possible be featured in videos and photos.

The videos, photos and data of the matches and the participants as well as analyses and statistics of the same shall be displayed on the organiser's website and in other media. Every participant itself may also decide on any further utilisation of the recordings and photos it shall have produced, just as the organisers may, also without restrictions and free of charge, decide about the use of the videos and photos transmitted to them by the participants or by their own partners and delegates.

The marketing rights relating to FTCup, the statistics prepared and the data collected and processed by the organiser shall be owned exclusively by the organiser, the organiser alone shall have the exclusive right to use, utilise or sell such rights, statistics and data and the organiser alone shall be exclusively entitled any revenues originating from these, and the organiser alone shall be entitled to sell these.

The organiser is a non-profit organisation, using its revenues for the organisation, staging and implementation of the FTCup and for charity activities. The participants and the organiser shall cooperate in the organisation and implementation of the programmes, and in the utilisation and sale of the media contents, rights and data in order to make sure that the FTCup can continue to be organised in the future as well, even possibly on a broader basis, with more international participant and different sports, using any receipts from such activities.



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### 20. Copyrights, Intellectual property

The organiser is the sole owner of the expressions Future Talents Cup and FTCup, which are its patented trademarks, and it is the exclusive owner of any existing and future rights relating to the FTCup events (name, logo, this competition code, brand, image, music, medal, plaque, sculpture, memorabilia, cup, data, statistics or any similar products).

Reproducing, distributing, using or utilising any of the above without the organiser's prior written consent shall be prohibited and illegal.

### 21. Closing Provisions

Decisions concerning unforeseen event shall be made by the organiser and/or the SAB.

In regard to translations of this code into any other language in the case of any difference in the texts of the different language versions the English language text shall prevail. The Court having jurisdiction over the registered office of Future Talents Cup nonprofit Kft. shall have competence in regard to any infringement relating to FTCup.



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### **Fair play evaluation rules**

#### **INTRODUCTION**

It is of utmost importance for the organisers that young players' progress and participation in sports should go hand in hand with familiarising themselves with, respect of and living up to the requirements of fair play.

contesting, the will to win and competitive spirit are crucial requisites of a successful sports career but all must be aware of the basic truth that respect and appreciation of others, helping and supporting the down and out are among the most profound obligations of man.

Based on these considerations the organiser shall evaluate and rank the teams and clubs behaving the most truly in accordance with the spirit of fair play. The organisers declare that they consider excelling in this to be at least as important as success in the tournament, and they request the participating clubs, players, sports managers, representatives as well as supporters to spare no effort to achieve the highest standards in fair play as well.

#### **THE METHOD OF EVALUATION**

Fair play 'performance' shall be assessed and graded in accordance with the following criteria. Positive attitude shall be taken more into account in the evaluation of each factor, assigning higher scores for better attitude and performance and the maximum number of points can only be given for behaviour based on the adequate attitude.

#### **THE CRITERIA TO BE EVALUATED**

Fair play 'performance' shall be assessed and graded in accordance with the following criteria. Positive attitude shall be taken more into account in the evaluation of each factor, assigning higher scores for better attitude and performance and the maximum number of points can only be given for behaviour based on the adequate attitude.

#### **YELLOW AND RED CARDS**

Up to 10 points can be given for a completed match, but the number of points that can be given is reduced by the number of points subtracted for yellow and red cards shown during the match, as a result of which it is even possible to be given a negative score (1 yellow card entails -1 point, red card after 2 yellow cards or immediate red card entails -3 points, 1 yellow followed by an immediate red card entails -4 points).

#### **SPECTACULAR, ENJOYABLE GAME (1-10 POINTS)**

Rewarding players aiming to score goals, evaluating the game accordingly.

Positive factors: Offensive football rather than defensive tactics, accelerating the game, wasting no time (e.g. players are not stalling the game even when they are winning the game), making efforts to score (even if bound to progress, or with just sufficient actual result).

Negative factors: slowing down the game, stalling the game, tactics based on faults, play acting



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### **RESPECT OF THE ADVERSARY (1-5 POINTS)**

The expectations include playing observance of the Rules of the Game and respect for the adversary. Though those committing faults can be penalised with yellow and red cards, what is to be evaluated from this aspect is faults not detected by the referee or those noticed but that cannot be adequately sanctioned by showing the yellow or the red card, or other events affecting the spirit of fair play or the absence of such (e.g. helping injured player of the opposite team, encouraging or clapping to adversary, etc.).

### **RESPECT FOR THE REFEREES (1-5 POINTS)**

The maximum score can be given for those paying respect to the referee, accepting his decisions without dispute and comments.

### **CONDUCT OF THE REPRESENTATIVES OF THE TEAMS (1-5 POINTS)**

Coaches and the official representatives of the teams are expected to contribute to raising the technical, tactical and moral standards and levels of their teams. Such endeavours are rewarded by the highest score, while the opposite entails lower scores.

### **CONDUCT OF SPECTATORS AND FANS (1-5 POINTS)**

Spectators and fans are a natural element of any sports event, their cheering is a key part of the game. Loud but fair cheering, singing, encouragement and maintaining a good atmosphere are to be appreciated as positive factors. Making offensive remarks, humiliation, intimidation entail reductions in the points. This element can only be evaluated if there is an appreciable number of supporters for a team present.

### **AGGREGATION**

The scores received for the above criteria must be aggregated. The maximum possible score is 40, or – if there were no supporters of a sufficient number present – 35 points. For the aggregated result the ratio of the score received to the maximum score must be calculated to four decimals, without rounding (e.g.  $27/35=0.7714$ ).

Brief verbal comments may be added concerning events affecting fair play in the match (e.g. adding explanation to the evaluation, noting outstanding gestures etc.).
